

How the European Union supports accessibility in Member States?

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About the European Disability Forum

- Advocacy umbrella organisation (100 members)
- 100 million Europeans with disabilities in Europe (15% EU population)
- Organisation of persons with disabilities, run by persons with disabilities
- Full implementation of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with disabilities (UN CRPD)
- Closely work with the European Union, the Council of Europe and the United Nations

Introduction

- Accessibility as a precondition to live independently and fully participate in society.
- The United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) creates a legal obligation for the European Union (EU) and Member States (MS) to promote accessibility and universal design.
- The EU, through its budget and competencies, can be an important actor shaping and pushing for the consideration of accessibility in relevant aspects of life.

Coexistence between MS and EU

EU Context I (Legislation)

ICT and Transport legislation:

- Web Accessibility Directive
- Audiovisual Media Services Directive
- Electronic Communications Code
- TEN-T Regulation
- Technical Specifications for Interoperability (TSI PRM)
- Passenger Rights Legislative Framework

Key milestone:

European Accessibility Act

EU Context II (Budget and Public Procurement)

• Investment capacity (Cohesion or Regional Funds, to name a few)

Relevant legislation:

- Common Provisions Regulation (Recital 6 and Articles 9 and 73)
- Directive on Public Procurement

EU Context III (Standards)

- ICT Products and Services (EN 301 549)
- Design For All (EN 17161)
- Built Environment (EN 17210)

In order to implement the EAA, three new standards will be developed:

- Accessibility for non-ICT products
- Accessibility of support services related to products and services
 Accessibility of Emergency Communications

EU Context IV (Accessible EU Centre)

- Flagship initiative of the European Disability Strategy 2021-2030
- Result of EDF proposal to create a new EU Agency
- EU Funded project with a limited duration in time
- Service to the Commission to enable practical implementation of EU legislation, connect stakeholders, one-stop-shop for knowledge.
- No regulatory powers.

EU Accessibility Challenges

- Accessibility is a transversal issue, not a sectorial one.
- Limited scope of important accessibility related legislation.
- EU legislation differently applied in Member States.
- Difficult enforcement of legislation
- Difficult implementation of EU funds

Conclusion

- Legal obligations and tools to ensure accessibility already exist.
- Lack of political will.
- Need to see accessibility as investment rather than a cost.
- Benefits for everyone.
